19th annual Howard County Women's Hall of Fame to induct five outstanding women

ELLICOTT CITY, MD – Howard County Executive Allan Kittleman and the Howard County Commission for Women announced today the 2015 inductees into the county's Women's Hall of Fame. Inductees will be honored at the 19th annual Women's Hall of Fame ceremony on Thursday, March 12, at 7:30 p.m. in the Banneker Room of the George Howard Building, 3430 Court House Drive in Ellicott City.  attorneys, a dedicated community volunteer and a role model for women in the workforce.
- Mavis Polson Lewis For more than 20 years, Lewis has served as the Campaign Chairperson for the Howard County Foundation for Black Educational and Cultural Achievement, Inc., helping to ensure a brighter future for Howard County youth by providing funding for higher education and helping older adults plan for a sound financial future.

- Colette Roberts In 1995, Roberts founded the Howard County chapter of PFLAG –
 Parents, Families and Friends of Lesbians and Gays. In the years since, she has worked
 tirelessly to help keep families together, promote equality and end discrimination on the
 basis of sexual orientation and gender identity.
- Courtney Watson As an insurance professional, Watson has forged a successful career
 protecting the rights of small businesses. As a member of the Howard County Council and
 the Howard County Board of Education, Watson carried on her family's legacy of public
 service, advocating for education and human rights and improving the lives of all Howard
 County residents.
- Margaret "Peg" Whyte Co-founder of the Grassroots Crisis Intervention Center and a
 tireless advocate for the Linwood Center, Whyte has spent a lifetime supporting, advocating
 for and inspiring the mental health and disabilities communities in Howard County. Most
 recently, as Linwood's Director of Development, she helped raise funds for the construction
 of a new building which now addresses the needs of nearly 100 individuals on the autism
 spectrum.

The March 12th induction ceremony will be immediately followed by a reception.
